

 - (b) Explain why some argue that the author of the Acts of the Apostles accompanied Paul on some parts of Paul's travels. [6]
 - (c) 'A more accurate title for the Acts of the Apostles would be the Acts of Paul.'

 To what extent do you agree? Show in your answer that you have considered more than one point of view.

- 2 (a) How is life in the early church described in the Acts of the Apostles? [6]
 - (b) What was the dispute about Gentiles becoming Christians and what conclusion did the Council of Jerusalem reach? [6]
 - (c) 'The reason the church spread was because of the miracles that the apostles did.'

 To what extent do you agree? Show in your answer that you have considered more than one point of view.

- 3 (a) How and why did the apostles choose the Seven? [6]
 - **(b)** Give a brief account of the work of Philip in the early church. [6]
 - (c) 'There was no difference between the work of the Seven and the work of the apostles.'

- 4 (a) Give an account of what happened in Cyprus on Paul's first missionary journey. [6]
 - (b) What was the strategy that Paul developed during his first missionary journey to convert non-believers and encourage new Christians? [6]
 - (c) 'Paul's first missionary journey met with failure rather than success.'

 To what extent do you agree? Show in your answer that you have considered more than one point of view.
