Generic Marking Principles

These general marking principles must be applied by all examiners when marking candidate answers. They should be applied alongside the specific content of the mark scheme or generic level descriptors for a question. Each question paper and mark scheme will also comply with these marking principles.

GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 1:

Marks must be awarded in line with:

- the specific content of the mark scheme or the generic level descriptors for the question
- the specific skills defined in the mark scheme or in the generic level descriptors for the question
- the standard of response required by a candidate as exemplified by the standardisation scripts.

GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 2:

Marks awarded are always whole marks (not half marks, or other fractions).

GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 3:

Marks must be awarded **positively**:

- marks are awarded for correct/valid answers, as defined in the mark scheme. However, credit
 is given for valid answers which go beyond the scope of the syllabus and mark scheme,
 referring to your Team Leader as appropriate
- marks are awarded when candidates clearly demonstrate what they know and can do
- marks are not deducted for errors
- marks are not deducted for omissions
- answers should only be judged on the quality of spelling, punctuation and grammar when these features are specifically assessed by the question as indicated by the mark scheme. The meaning, however, should be unambiguous.

GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 4:

Rules must be applied consistently, e.g. in situations where candidates have not followed instructions or in the application of generic level descriptors.

GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 5:

Marks should be awarded using the full range of marks defined in the mark scheme for the question (however; the use of the full mark range may be limited according to the quality of the candidate responses seen).

GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 6:

Marks awarded are based solely on the requirements as defined in the mark scheme. Marks should not be awarded with grade thresholds or grade descriptors in mind.

She might also encourage students to study music if they are able to see it is a career choice with prospects which might save Mrs Dvorin from having the difficult task of having to make a music teacher redundant. (She might be impressed) Franzi has done more than she was asked to for the competition as she has provided a full transcript of her podcast and a blog post that could be exploited in more ways than just the school's website to enhance the school's image, such as being published in the school magazine or local paper, and, according to experts, not everyone likes to listen to material; some prefer to read it, so Franzi's entry would appeal to those kinds of people, plus she could be held up as a good example of a diligent student aiming high, showing that the school does have students of calibre still. A successful female scientist and a woman achieving great things in two fields would be an excellent role model forthe female students at BHS. The quality of the intro and outro music will be exceptional as award-winning Dr Duchamp has composed it which could bring more positive publicity to BHS if Dr Duchamp acknowledges it/ uploads it to her own website/ the press hears about her musical contribution outweighing the quality of Franzi's recording is not always good so this might adversely affect a listener's enjoyment of the podcast or reflect badly on the technical abilities of BHS students if this were
